Teacher's notes

WHAT CAN YOU SEE IN THE WOOD?

Language: Point to the.../How many ... can you see? What colour are they? Wolves, trees, flowers, rabbits, squirrels, owls, butterflies, deer

Resources: What can you see in the wood? activity sheet, wood flashcards; materials for a wood collage e.g. poster paper or card, brown and green tissue paper and/or crepe paper, leaves, twigs, crayons

- a) Introduce the topic of woods through the Little Red Riding Hood story and ask your children if they've been in a wood. Did they see or hear any animals? What did the trees and plants look like?
- b) Now show them the picture What can you see in the wood? and ask them to listen and point to, then listen and count e.g.
