



Numeracy

- Find out simple number facts about the Titanic, for example: How many passengers were on board? How long was the ship? How many lifeboats there were? How many people survived? How many funnels did the Titanic have?
- Write your own word problems related to the Titanic with answers.



Out and About!

- Explore sinking and floating. Use materials around the house to invent something that will allow a £1 coin to float.
- What materials can you make a ship from? What wouldn't work?



Literacy

- Create a word search using words relating to the Titanic.
- Write a story set in the Titanic – it must be at least one side of A4 long.
- Make a poster to advertise the launch of the Titanic.
- Make an acrostic poem about the Titanic.
- Create a storyboard or newspaper about the sinking of the Titanic.
- Write a recount as a survivor.



Working with Others

- Make a box model of the Titanic.
- Discuss facts about the Titanic with an adult. Work with an adult to create a 'Top Ten Titanic Facts' list.
- Write a postcard to a family member from the ship.
- Visit the library and find books about the Titanic. Create an information leaflet explaining the Titanic.

- Design a ticket for the Titanic.

Let's Get Technical!

- Search for images of New York's skyline to show what people travelling to America on a ship might see.

- Tell an adult about the differing experiences of first and third class passengers.
- Create a menu for dinner on the Titanic.
